A letter from The Most Reverend John McDowell Primate of All Ireland

Dear Friends,

First, many thanks to our All Ireland President, June Butler, for this invitation to write a few words for this edition of Focus.

I am very grateful to June and to Debbie our Diocesan President in Armagh for keeping me up to date on MU activities and for inviting me to sundry events. It was a great treat to meet and have a long discussion with Mrs Sheran Harper, the MU World Wide President, when she visited Ireland late last year. For someone from Guyana the Irish climate in November must have been quite a challenge, but I know Sheran found the welcome warm wherever she went. As well as discussing a very wide range of MU business, I discovered that Sheran is married to Roger Harper who I am old enough to remember as a very fine right arm off break bowler in the great West Indies cricket team of the 1980s and 1990s!

I would like to thank all of you who play your part as members or officeholders in this remarkable organisation. Particularly I would like to pay tribute to the work that is being done in raising awareness of the horrors of gender-based violence, in the home and in society. It is a profoundly Christian work to recognise and uphold the dignity of all human life and to cherish it especially in the context of marriage. All human relationships are in a sense sacramental and the relationship of marriage centrally so, which makes it deeply tragic and painful when such a sacred relationship becomes violent or oppressive.

Domestic violence is a deep seated and largely hidden problem and I have been very moved and impressed by the work that Mother's Union is doing in this area, not least in providing space for victims of domestic violence to tell their story, should they feel able to do so.

However, I know too that the bread and butter work of the MU lies in the monthly round of meetings, worship and activities, no more so than in the winter months which are now drawing to a close. These are particularly wearying times for people who find it difficult to get out, and the vocation which you have of visiting indoor members will have been greatly valued by those who have had such a long connection with MU but are no longer able to meet for fellowship as they would have done in the past. So, thank you for helping to bring the presence of God and His Church into so many homes.

Perhaps it's a bit early to talk about Spring, but it's at this time of year that I begin to yearn to see trees again in full leaf and I hope that Lent and Easter will provide each of you with an opportunity to renew your faith and discipleship as children of the Resurrection.

A Letter from June Butler

Hello Everyone

It is a delight to me to be able to write to all our members again through Focus. The Trustees of All Ireland Mothers' Union realised that, with increasing costs and distribution difficulties, it was not going to be practical to publish an autumn edition – instead, therefore, you are now getting a "bumper" spring 2023 edition which can be easily distributed when representatives from all the Dioceses meet at our triennial conference at An Grianán in Co Louth at the end of March. I hope you enjoy finding out what your fellow members across Ireland have been doing during the past year.

The conference I just mentioned will focus on "Reimagining Mothers' Union" - something which we will have to take very seriously if MU is going to flourish coming out of the Covid pandemic. I recently read some words attributed to the naturalist and biologist Charles Darwin: "It is not the strongest of the species that survives, not the most intelligent. It is one that is most responsive to change".

Mothers' Union across the world will have to change in some ways to meet a range of different challenges – health, climate change, fewer resources and changes in technology, education and church to name but a few. We in Ireland are no different and we will be focussing on how we might adapt to meet those challenges while still maintaining our core aims and objectives and of course being there to support all our members and those in our communities in times of need. We should remember what Paul wrote to the Romans in ch12 v2: *"Do not conform to the pattern of this world but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is —his good, pleasing and perfect will."*

One of our main concerns across Ireland is the apparent reluctance of some members to attend regular meetings - many have become so accustomed to being at home that they will not venture out, especially not in the evenings. Another issue is that branches are closing because no one is willing to assume roles such as branch leader or secretary. Thus we may have to change our ways of thinking about how Mothers' Union will work "on the ground", but this need not be either radical or sudden – we have to maintain our heritage too.

My branch in Saintfield has decided to vary its pattern of meetings and we now meet sometimes in the evenings and sometimes on Saturday mornings, which also accommodates those who are in employment. Occasionally we venture outside the parish and combine forces with neighbouring branches for key speakers and services. Also we try to demonstrate to potential new members that we are much more than a "clique" of well-meaning parishioners by explaining about some of the work we are doing in the fields of domestic abuse, supporting refugees, maintaining overseas projects to enhance literacy, numeracy and the environment and of course our work at home with foodbanks, providing well needed breaks to distressed families and giving vouchers for basic essentials to those struggling "to make ends meet" and to parents to help them meet the cost of school books and uniforms.

The need for some lateral thinking about we operate and thrive as a body was also one of the concerns the eleven Diocesan Presidents and I addressed when we met together for an "away day" at the end of January (see the photograph on P.5). It was a great opportunity to share our work in branches and the wonderful projects undertaken by members in our dioceses. However, we also gave considerable thought to the challenges facing Mothers' Union at the present time and some of the themes which emerged were:

- The need for better communication to and from branches
- The fact that good leadership at both branch and diocesan level was critical
- The need to work more within our communities and liaise with local organisations working in
- their specialist fields (great examples already of connections with foodbanks, schools and local refuges)
 The need to work more closely with and support our clergy.

Ireland is not unique in having to address such matters – reimagining MU was a theme which emerged during the wonderful Annual Gathering which All Ireland hosted in Belfast at the end of September last year. The services in Belfast Cathedral (St Anne's) on the evening of 23rd were really uplifting, especially

the inspirational address given by Bishop Andrew Forster, and the Gathering itself on Saturday gave everyone who attended much food for thought. There is coverage of that event elsewhere in Focus.

Another highlight of our year in 2022 was the visit of MU Worldwide President, Sheran Harper, in November. Reports and photographs of how she engaged with members over those five days are also covered in this publication. I had the privilege of hosting her visit and everyone who met her was not only charmed by her personality but were left in awe by her Christian outreach, her commitment to Mothers' Union and her amazing knowledge and wisdom. A very special lady!

Before I end I would like to pay tribute to those Diocesan Presidents who ended their term of office just before or during 2022 - Irene Boyd (Clogher), Sophia Dillon (Armagh), Lucy Kavanagh (Limerick and Killaloe), Roberta Macartney (Down and Dromore), Karen Nelson (Dublin and Glendalough) and Hazel Speares (Kilmore, Elphin and Ardagh). They did marvellous work leading and inspiring the members in their dioceses in recent years. I would also acknowledge the dedication and expertise of other All Ireland Trustees who have recently stepped down from their various roles - Kay Clarke, Joy Gordon and Beth Wortley. Three other people I would like to acknowledge and thank for all their work on our behalf are: Norma Bell who for six years has been committed to recognising important birthdays and anniversaries of our Indoor Members; Brigid Barrett who has been a stalwart Administrator for the past year (and kept me right on so many things!); and of course our All Ireland Chaplain, Revd. Canon Robert Deane who sadly has had to step down from this role due to ill health. We will miss his calm presence and his special skill in preparing, with Beth, much of our All Ireland worship.

I will finish with a verse from Joshua C1 V9 which I hope will give you courage as you give some thought to and work to strengthen the future of MU in your branch – and diocese. We must remember that God is walking this journey with us:

"Have I not commanded you? Be strong and courageous. Do not be afraid; do not be discouraged, for the LORD your God will be with you wherever you go."

What does it take to be a BYSTANDER?

I have come in order that you might have life—life in all its fullness. John 10:10

Recently, Eve, a Holocaust survivor, aged 92, spoke in Belfast of her traumatic experiences. As she left the podium she turned and stated decisively,

'If there is one strong message, I want you to take from here, it is this - DO NOT BE A BYSTANDER, have courage, take action, stand up, speak out and be counted.'

Being a bystander is often associated with violence against women, but it doesn't start there, it starts in the cradle. Not all disrespect towards women results in violence. *But all violence against women starts with disrespectful behaviour.* Our children form their beliefs from the world around them – what they hear, see, talk about and from the stories, people and experiences that are an integral part of their childhood.

I don't agree with that comment.

Sorry, what do you mean by that? What we expect of men and women is often subtle, not noticed or seen as normal and accepted as the way things are, and often remarks making fun of a girl or boy because of their appearance or gender eg. 'stop kicking the ball like a girl', without realising it can serve to reinforce and develop disrespectful attitudes.

Yes, we want what's best for them. Though sometimes, without meaning to, we ignore disrespectful behaviour, prefer not to get involved or make excuses to protect our children.

However, what we think is acceptable and normal can change over time. We no longer think that drinking and driving is acceptable. At one time, women were not considered intelligent enough to vote and a man giving up work to look after children would have been unthinkable!

Some of the most common ways we excuse disrespectful and aggressive behaviour include:

- playing down disrespectful behaviour
- accepting aggression as just part of being a boy
- blaming girls who are treated with disrespect.

Gradually, boys and girls start to believe that disrespect is just a normal part of growing up.



So often we hear something, see something and we let it pass. Yet through taking small, courageous actions in our daily life, together we can create a significant cultural shift.

In the Gospels, we see how Jesus, time and again, challenges the culture around him in both words and actions. When he heard or saw something he knew was not right, he stood up and said so, often to the

surprise of those around him. We are called to follow His example.

An active bystander is someone who steps in having witnessed or heard about an incident or situation they do not think is right. The action they take is called 'bystander action'. Would you say that if she was a man?

That joke

isn't funny.

I'm concerned about what you said earlier?

It is about taking action in response to everyday sexism, gender stereotypes, disrespect towards women, and anything that excuses or trivialises violence against women.

TOGETHER WE CAN HELP STOP THE CYCLE OF VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN

As role models, we can have a positive influence and set the standard for what is and what's not acceptable, right from the start.

- We can be more aware of the excuses we make, and how they can have a lasting impact.
- We can start having conversations about respect with boys and girls.
- We can 'stop it at the start' and help prevent violence against women.



Preventing violence against women is everyone's business. Bystander action is a highly effective way to create positive culture change. We can each find a way of taking action that works for us. The important thing is that we

do something. With Jesus' teaching and example as our guide

our small actions can make a big difference. By being intentional and making the most of such opportunities in our daily interactions, we can create and reinforce the culture we wish to see – one where everyone can flourish and know life in its fullness. (John 10:10)

 Please note - this programme will be launched in 2023 with an exciting event in both jurisdictions – watch out for dates and venues.
- Thanks to a **Mind Matters** grant a group are undertaking training to facilitate the creation of a **Survivors' Wellness Group.**
- The **RTE 16 Days** service on 4th December was very well received and much commented upon.
- **16 Days 2022** around the dioceses wonderful diversity and creative thinking was evident. Reports are found among the diocesan notes. All dioceses linked in with their local domestic abuse services and provided items and much appreciated vouchers.
- Interesting discussions continued with Safe Ireland and Women's Aid Federation NI
- Mothers' Union took part in two important consultations:
 -NI Domestic and Sexual Abuse Strategy and the new Equally Safe Strategy and met with representatives from NI Executive Team on Domestic and Sexual Abuse, and GBV
 -R of I Third National Domestic, Sexual and Gender-based Violence Strategy 2022-2026
- MU attended a **Shared Island Dialogue** on Domestic Abuse and are invited to approach Minister for Justice in the Republic of Ireland, Helen McEntee, on her return from maternity leave.
- MOVE Men Overcoming Violence a government NGO, promoting the wellbeing and safety of women and their children currently in Leinster, Munster and Galway. MOVE also run courses for perpetrators.
- Attended the **GREVIO** launch with the *National Observatory on Violence Against Women and Girls*. GREVIO is the independent expert body which informs the European Parliament of Ireland's progress in relation to domestic abuse and highlights what needs to be done to fulfil the commitments as a signatory of the Istanbul Convention.

Welcome to Ireland – Ukrainian Teddy Project

'I was a stranger and you welcomed me' (Matthew 25). We have all been touched by the tragedy unfolding in Ukraine, particularly the plight of women and child refugees. Derry & Raphoe Mothers' Union decided to knit comfort teddies, so applied for a 'Mums in May' grant to purchase a bulk order of safety tested Cygnet Yarn and polyester filling in compliance with CE Toy Safety Directive.



Members and friends started knitting immediately, with a shared vision of creating 200 teddies in colours of the Ukrainian flag. Each comfort teddy was placed in a gift bag with a specially designed 'Teddy Passport,' featuring a welcome and blessing in three languages. Teddies were distributed to Ukrainian refugee families in the joint diocese through word of mouth, primary schools, and other agencies. For Ukraine Independence Day on 24th August, Donegal Local Development CLG presented 120 teddies with passports to child refugees under 4 years of age. Teddies were very well received.

In December, 80 Derry & Raphoe teddy welcome packs were delivered to the Kiltonga Christian Centre. This Christian charity works with churches and local agencies to provide newly arrived refugee families throughout Northern Ireland with clothes and household items. Just before Christmas, Belfast City Council contacted Kiltonga to request teddy welcome packs for a special event hosted by the Lady Lord Mayor on 8th January. This was a wonderful gathering for six hundred Ukrainian mothers and children, and local VIPS to celebrate Christmas on Ukraine's traditional date.



Young people in national costume entertained with their beautiful carol singing and dancing, then Saint Nicholas distributed presents, with children of 3-5 years of age receiving MU Ukrainian teddies. Afterwards, there was a delicious Ukrainian meal for everyone. It was great privilege to attend such a moving and significant celebration of our Lord's coming.

We continue d to support many projects such as AFIA, our School Book & Bursary Scheme, local Women Refuges and our involvement with the Midlands Prison has also been renewed. We are very grateful to all of our members



who so generously support these projects and for the grants received from "Mums in May"

Our Diocesan President continues to hold services via ZOOM every Tuesday evening and produces a monthly newsletter keeping members informed of all that is happening in Mothers' Union both in the Diocese and at All Ireland level. We were delighted to welcome our newly appointed Bishop, the Right Revd. Adrian Wilkinson to refreshments after our Autumn Council Meeting.

Cork, Cloyne and Ross Diocese

Spring is here, and our weather is as changeable as the seasons; but thankfully our God remains the same – as loving and concerned for the welfare of His creation as always. We are always grateful for the love, hard work and dedication of Mothers' Union members the length and breadth of the land as we progress our shared ministry of care to those in need. As we begin this year's theme of Transformation- Moving Forward after a year of much activity, we continue the process of re-emerging from the pandemic. Here in Cork, Cloyne and Ross, members gathered together on a number of occasions during Autumn and Winter in a variety of ways.



Socially, members gathered during the summer on two occasions. In July, we met up in the stunningly beautiful church of The Ascension in Timoleague, West Cork. The interior of the church is unique in that most of the interior walls are covered with amazing Mosaics. We were greeted at the church by the Rector, the Revd. Kingsley Sutton, who gave us a brief history of the church and of the mosaics. Some restoration of the exterior of the building was also taking place as lime mortar was being restored to the walls. This will protect the inside of the building from damp, so protecting the precious mosaics. After the talk we enjoyed our packed lunches, seated under the yew trees in the churchyard. Luckily the weather was very pleasant that day. In August, some members were welcomed into St Mary's Church in Doneraile, North Cork, by the Rector of Mallow Union, the Revd. Meurig Williams. We celebrated Mary Sumner Day together with a short service, then some went for a walk around Doneraile Park which is just across the road from the church.

As part of the **Reimagining Mothers' Union** process, a small group of Trustees planned and organised two meetings in Carrigaline (August) and Clonakilty (September) as a follow-up to the Reimagining MU conference which took place in Liverpool in July. It was a great opportunity for members to reconnect with each other as we re-emerged from lockdowns, but we also had a task to do! Hilary Dring and Hazel Sweetnam (our delegates) were tasked with sharing the Liverpool discussions with members, and to receive feedback from them, with the aim of coming up with **3 committed actions** to show how we would "re-imagine MU" within our diocese. Both days were well attended and much appreciated by members. Our 3 committed actions based on feedback from evaluation forms were: 1) **Tell the story of MU** and show how important MU is in a parish. 2) **Stay connected** – it's important to keep the present members informed of everything that is happening. 3) We must do a better job of **marketing ourselves**, who we are and what we do.

Our work with **AFIA** continues apace. We have been continuing our voucher support to families in need in schools. The fund has also supported a variety of activities for Ukrainian adults and children who have contact with the Carrig Centre in Ballincollig. We have reached 22 children who have enjoyed Lego Summer Camp. Another 16 children have been able to enjoy a series of swimming lessons. The formation of a Ukrainian Choir is reaching 25 adults and 4 children. An Irish family of 10 enjoyed a 3-night stay in Trabolgan Holiday Centre which they were thrilled with and they cannot thank Mothers' Union enough.

As part of highlighting the "16 Days" campaign last year, the exhibition entitled "The Souls of Our Shoes" came to Cork in November. It was exhibited in the Carrig Centre in Ballincollig, and after that it moved to St Mary's Church in Carrigaline. There was a steady stream of visitors, many of whom were deeply moved by what they saw and read. It got very good publicity in the local press.



Cork, Cloyne & Ross Getaway Weekend

The year ended with our annual "Getaway Weekend" in the Garryvoe Hotel in East Cork. Our theme was "Transformation – Moving On". What a blessing that weekend was to those who came! In total about fifty-five people gathered to enjoy fellowship (there was a lot of catching up to do after three years!) relaxation and fun with workshops, free time and excellent food, along with spiritual nourishment with three wonderful people speaking to us over the weekend.

Revd. Isobel Jackson, our Diocesan Chaplain, shared her faith and life story which was so interesting and encouraging. How good it is to look back at what God has done in our lives – sometimes we don't see things at the time but in hindsight can really recognise how He has led us all the way. Rev Isobel also led our worship on Saturday morning on the theme of transformation.



Our guest speaker on Saturday was former Archbishop, Richard Clarke. It is hard to fully convey the both encouraging and challenging message he brought us in two sessions; the first on transformation of ourselves as individuals, and the second on Mothers' Union as an institution. He quoted some words of St Catherine of Siena *"Be who God meant you to be and you will set the world on fire,"* We were challenged to allow Jesus to move us from the shallow waters to deeper ones, just as he said to Simon Peter in Luke chapter 5. He said that in his years of ministry, Mothers' Union members have often asked 'What can we do to help the church?' He suggests that we must now look at how we can take the lead and tell the church what it should be doing when it comes to injustice and the many challenges we face in society.

During this 16 Days of Activism from 25th November – 10th December, we were trying to increase awareness of this issue for more people by having the daily Broadcasts via Zoom and then YouTube with speakers from several services that support victims of abuse. Speaking at this seminar, Professor Pat Barker, Counsellor, Dublin Rape Crisis Centre, and Ms Lydia Monds, Education Advisor, Bishop's Appeal, spoke about the impact of gender-based violence. Tips were given on how to be a good listener to those who wish to tell of their own experience and how best to steer them to appropriate support service.

International Widow's Day was celebrated on Thursday 23rd June 2022, in Kilternan Parish Church, the Celebrant was Revd. Rob Clements. Lunch was served afterwards in the Gathering Centre.
