A Letter from June Butler:

Hello Everyone,

I am writing this at the beginning of January on what must be one of the coldest days of this year – a really sharp frost, almost resembling snow, is on every surface outdoors. Last year was very strange weatherwise – a mild spring, a lengthy period of heat and then rain, followed by named storms......sorry I seem to be falling into the obsession of those who live on this island of talking about the weather! However, I cannot help but think that we are blessed by living here when one sees the extremes faced by our Mother's Union colleagues across the world.... drought, hurricanes, floods...and of course shortages of food and drinking water. Please pray for all who are afflicted by such dreadful conditions.



The past year has been one of travel for me – both across Ireland and further afield. Here, I think I have placed my feet (or at least directed the tyres of my car) in every diocese in Ireland and I have been privileged to be able to attend Mothers' Union services and events in many of them. Three which are particularly memorable for me are a CFO event and service in Kilkenny in February, the Cork MU conference in Garryvoe in November and the Women's Getaway in Cavan (KEA) in October. You will be reading about all of these in this edition of Focus, especially the Getaway, which was a wonderful, inspirational (and fun) event.

Our key speaker, Melanie Douglas, took as her theme for the weekend "Living an Abundant Life" and encouraged us through prayer and action to do just that. She based her talk - and songs - over the two days on John 10:10: "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." All of us left Cavan knowing that we had had an abundant experience and thinking about how we might carry that into the future. Our lives cover the full spectrum of what Shakespeare called the "Seven Ages of Man" and in each of those we should take what opportunities we have been given to live life to the full. We in Mothers' Union certainly do that as we work to help those in adversity in our communities. Again, much of that will be in evidence in this magazine. In Ecclesiastes 3 we read "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven" reminding us that the purpose and order behind everything we do have been ordained by God.

Bishop Michael Burrows had a very focussed purpose when he planned his "peregrination" across his Diocese of Tuam, Limerick and Killaloe in November and I was privileged to join him on the last stages of his marathon. In the tradition of supporting overseas mission work in the period before Advent, Bishop Michael was raising funds by undertaking a musical marathon – visiting each of the parishes in his Diocese where he was playing the organ and getting everyone present to join him in singing Hymn 86 ("Christ is the King, Oh friends rejoice.....").



As one of the two projects he was supporting was the MU Literacy project in Burundi, he had kindly invited me to join him, which I did for two days. It was wonderful experience for me as I was able to visit churches big and small in Co Galway, some in places of which I had never heard, and I was overwhelmed by the welcome and kindness of the clergy and parishioners. To quote from the final verse of that hymn "...new lamps be lit, new tasks begun....." Could this be a theme for Mothers' Union in the future? Just to add a footnote – Bishop Michael collected donations of over 20,000 Euro during his expedition and we thank him sincerely on behalf of those people in Burundi whose lives will now be improved immeasurably as they learn how to read and write.

So where will our Mothers' Union journey take us in 2024? You may know that this year we will experiment by holding the monthly Holy Communion services in every diocese, rather than in Christchurch Cathedral, Dublin on the first Thursday of each month. The programme of those services is on our website. Everyone is invited to attend whatever services they wish to, wherever is convenient for them, and in some cases it will be possible to join from your home if the service is being live streamed.

This is the triennial year when we are due to replenish our Mums in May Fund and our focus to do this will take three strands. The first involves holding events such as coffee mornings and tea parties to enable members and friends to spend time together. Then there is the new puzzle book for everyone to challenge themselves; our thanks to all who have contributed to and designed it – Margaret Jacob led that team. Thirdly there is the "Big Hymn Sing." Each diocese will hold at least one BHS service to include those hymns which have been voted as the favourites within that diocese. I will attend as many of those services as I can and am really looking forward to our voices raising a few church roofs! Again, every member - and their friends and family - are welcome to attend any service. We will launch the "Big Hymn Sing" in St. Canice's Cathedral, Kilkenny on 2nd March and end the series of services with a rousing finish in St Patrick's Parish Church in Ballymena on 16th November. The collections at all those services will go towards the Mums in May Fund which enables Mothers' Union in Ireland to make a difference in so many ways to those in our communities who are struggling.

That "Big Hymn Sing" will be my final All Ireland event – I find it difficult to believe that I am in my sixth year as your All Ireland President! It has been a privilege to work with you all over those years and to spend quality time with so many of you. We must all pray earnestly about finding my successor and for potential inspirational leaders to come forward in those dioceses which will be conducting elections for a new Diocesan President.

I was at a service recently where the Gospel was taken from Luke 4, about Jesus was preaching in Galilee, and it occurred to me how appropriate His words were for all of us as members of Mothers' Union:

"The Spirit of the Lord is on me, because he has anointed me to proclaim good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim freedom for the prisoners and recovery of sight for the blind, to set the oppressed free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour."

My prayer for 2024 is that it will be a year in which we can continue to proclaim His good news, that we can endeavour to help all those who may be struggling or suffering, and that the Holy Spirit will remain with us and into the future.

Mothers' Union Changing the Story of Domestic Abuse in Ireland

The arrival of covid highlighted the plight of women locked in their homes with their abuser. The need to understand, to highlight and to signpost took on new significance. During this period Ireland forged stronger partnerships with local domestic abuse services, *Safeguarding Church of Ireland*, produced a *16 Days Prayer Diary* highlighting church supports, worked with *Bishops' Appeal and Tearfund Ireland* to create a 5 part gender justice programme, and with Restored edited an Irish edition of 'A Guide for Churches to address Domestic Abuse'. Survivors spoke of the long term effects of trauma on emotional, mental, and physical well-being, and this led to training with Kintsugi Hope and the creation of 'Changing the Story' wellbeing groups.



To celebrate these initiatives and to bring the issue of 'domestic abuse' into the foreground, many months of planning came to fruition with a 'Changing the Story' Conference in Portadown and Dublin.

The Bible Does Not Tell Me So Speak Up

The keynote sessions were fascinating, informative, and brilliantly led by Bekah Legg of Restored and Revd. Dr. Helen Paynter, Biblical Scholar, and author of 'The Bible doesn't tell me so.' In exploring the biblical context, they encouraged delegates to seek to uphold God's plan for relationships between men and women, to answer his call to seek justice and defend the oppressed. So engaging were these sessions that one delegated wished she 'could bottle their message and have it shared in every church in Ireland.'

'Equipping The Church to take Action and End Domestic Abuse' Programme

Having undertaken the programme, the Revd. Graham Hare, and the Revd. William Stacey, shared how their parish teams now feel better equipped to speak about domestic abuse and in signposting people in the right direction. They actively raise awareness in their churches and community and have connected with local women's refuges and relevant local services.



Archbishop John McDowell and Archbishop Michael Jackson pledged their support and emphasised their encouragement to as many people as possible, and in particular to as many men as possible, to undertake the programme and bring the issue to the forefront of their parishes.

The power of a survivor

"I am not weak. I am not useless. I am not worthless. I am strong. I am capable and I am valued. I am a survivor." With these compelling words, Lesley Bayley brought home the reality of domestic abuse. Here, the excellent theoretical and practical information expressed at the 'Changing the Story' conferences was brought sharply into focus and in the minutes that Lesley spoke to her captivated audience you could hear a pin drop.

The Revd. Mike Buchanan, a Deacon Intern and retired Garda stated that in his experience 'people who experience domestic abuse know that it is insidious, engenders fear, is disruptive of life, menacing, undermines security, and destroys confidence and self-esteem.'

The chairperson of the Church of Ireland's Mind Matters programme, Bishop Pat Storey, agreed that the Church should be entirely visible and vocal in positively supporting the MU campaign. She noted that Mind Matters research into mental health is encouraging in that it has found people do appreciate support from their faith and their church community.



Bishop George Davison found the message of the Kintsugi Hope Wellbeing groups a helpful message to the church as 'we are all broken and therein lies beauty. Out of brokenness good can come. We are called to be communities of love for all our children, communities of hope.'



RISE UP

It was a great privilege to welcome Emily Brailsford, MU Domestic Abuse Manager to Ireland. Emily expertly guided delegates through the **Rise Up Challenge** and branches and parishes were motivated to take on the Bronze challenge in coming months.

Colette Stewart, **Onus** Chief Executive, detailed **Safe Place and Safe Church** training. A number of parishes currently engage with this programme. Joy Silcock spoke of her parish's experience of becoming a Safe Church and encouraged parishes to get involved.



Karen Devlin, Women's Aid NI and Mary McDermott, Safe Ireland affirmed that conferences like Changing the Story are a gift beyond measure in bringing the message to the wider community, whilst, in describing domestic abuse as a social responsibility, Detective Superintendent Lindsay Fisher, noted that the PSNI are contacted every 16 minutes in relation to domestic abuse.



Our Christian response in Moving Forward to change the story.....

In his closing remarks Bishop Andrew Forster emphasised that "Our Christian responses to domestic abuse and gender based violence need to be joyfully and wonderfully embedded in our ministry, to become an intrinsic part of our culture and in the life and culture of our church. We need to listen, believe the victim and respond appropriately."



He thanked Mothers' Union for being the heartbeat in parishes and, the stone in the shoe, the one that makes people uncomfortable and makes them think. 'It calls us back to our Christian calling and our need to do something – to speak up, speak out and respond. This involves men and women working together for the betterment of our society."

Delegates left feeling empowered and meaningfully engaged. 'Many seeds were sown, and we pray that in time all people will come to know that 'in their culture, in their community and in their church that they matter, that they deserve to be safe, valued, empowered, and equipped.' (Revd Graham Hare)

A Letter from The Most Reverend Francis John McDowell:

Dear Friends.

Sometimes I ask myself why is it that the seasons we have just celebrated, Christmas and Epiphany, appeal to church goers and non-church goers alike far more than the season we are moving towards-Easter? Possibly it is because Christmas and Epiphany are unequivocally about generosity and gift giving. There is a tangibility about Christmas which is very difficult to replicate in the shape of a few chocolate eggs, no matter how superior they may be.

Or is it that Lent (as its name implies) is just a bit too long and somewhat overshadows the joy of Easter morning.

One of the features of the life of the family (and I think by extension) the life of the Mothers' Union is generosity. The generosity of those who give voluntarily of their time in parishes to organise the yearly programme and to make sure that indoor members feel included in the life of the organisation. A generosity of sympathy which I see in my own limited perambulations to services and events. Two national initiatives stand out in this regard.

First the sixteen days activism against gender violence which must make the MU one of the biggest witnesses against all sorts of gender based violence-whether in the home or in solidarity with those in other Anglican Provinces where the place of women in society is precarious and where women often subject to all kinds of official violences against their dignity. I have on two occasions in the past two years experienced a very open generosity from people who shared their stories in a way that was both realistic and inspiring, although costly.

Secondly Mums in May, the triennial fund raising effort that helps resource so many generous projects, not least assisting families who have very limited means to enjoy a bit of a break in the summertime.

No doubt there are times when we need to be prudent and cautious with our substance and with our lives and energies, but it is the nature of God and of those who he has adopted as his children to be marked by generosity, and this generosity is as much to do with time and talents and encouragement as it is to do with money. It has been my good fortune throughout all my life to have seen that spirit of generosity from Mothers' Union branches and gatherings.

In that same spirit I hope you won't mind if I share some hopes of my own about expressing the generosity that God has shown to us in his Son, in a way that is as tangible as Christmas and as powerful as Easter.

As people who are used to being in and around churches, we feel at ease in them. Our parish churches are comfortable and I hope homely places to us. However, to people not used to being in one of our churches (believers and unbelievers alike) they can seem rather formidable and forbidding. Gothic architecture may not be as attractive to them as it is to us! I am thinking here about people who come to Ireland north and south from other countries whether as workers, refugees, or migrants. I don't see very many of such people as I travel around and I can't help thinking that the natural human warmth of women gathered together would be a way of breaking down those barriers and of lowering the step into church a little.

I wish I had more practical ideas on how this could be done (perhaps an invitation to simple meal?) and I know that, as generous people, some of you will have been working at this sort of initiative for a long time. We can only try with generous hearts.

The 16 Days RISE UP call

Our heartfelt thanks for the wonderful work you do in supporting survivors and victims and in our growing partnerships with domestic abuse services.

We are very aware of the statistics - Worldwide, 1 in 3 women can expect to be affected by gender based violence during their lifetime. It is sad that whilst both men and women may experience incidents of inter-personal violence and abuse, women are considerably more likely to experience repeated and severe forms of abuse, including sexual violence.

We know the effects are widespread and damaging across all strata of society. Thanks to your outreach, the carpet is being lifted and these effects are less hidden and more widely spoken of than in any other decade of our lifetime.



During the 16 Days of Activism our Mothers' Union 'RISE UP against domestic abuse Challenge' was launched, thus prayerfully and practically ensuring our outreach will stretch throughout the year.

What is the RISE UP Challenge?

At the core of **RISE UP** is an acronym, **RISE UP** encourages parishes and communities to **R**espond, Inform, **S**upport and **E**mpower as they Unite in Prayer and hope filled action to change the story of domestic abuse in their communities.

The RISE UP challenge aims to achieve this goal through its RISE UP Bronze, Silver, and Gold Award Scheme. This Challenge has been receiving a positive response, with many parishes already undertaking the three tenets required to achieve the bronze award.

To achieve the Bronze award a branch and/or parish should:

- 1. **Place RISE UP posters** raising awareness about domestic abuse in an appropriate public space e.g. churches, parish halls, toilets, community centres, medical centres etc.
- 2. **Commit to pray** for those affected by domestic abuse, including the victims, survivors, perpetrators, and those who work in the field of domestic abuse.
- 3. **Make a connection with the local domestic abuse support organisation** and see how one can support them.

Awareness raising - the RISE UP call during the 16 Days of Activism?



During the 16 Days Armagh, Clogher, Connor and Down & Dromore hosted Prayer Breakfasts with speakers ranging from a moving survivor's story to informative and heartfelt pleas on behalf of victims and survivors expressed by Women's Aid, Tearmann and the PSNI. Tuam, Limerick & Killaloe welcomed Noeline Blackwell, former CEO of Dublin Rape Crisis Centre, whilst Dublin & Glendalough hosted a diocesan Prayer Walk in the Phoenix Park led by Rev Kevin Ronné, whose meditations reflected his pastoral experience in South Africa. In Meath & Kildare Lynn Buckle, author, compellingly spoke of a variety of victims' personal experiences interspersed with passages from her acclaimed novel, 'The Groundsmen.'

In new ventures Derry & Raphoe held an engaging 16 Days RISE UP Roadshow with stands manned by the Diocesan Youth Officer on mental health, the PSNI, PCSP, Souls of Our Shoes, the MU RISE UP team and Omagh Women's Aid. Cork, Cloyne, and Ross engaged with the general public who visited their 16 Days stand raising awareness of domestic abuse in Douglas Village Shopping Centre. They are now encouraged to think about doing something similar in other shopping centres.

Lisburn and Derriaghy Area created a helpful 16 Days leaflet.



Kilmore, Elphin and Ardagh compiled a Prayer Walk for town, village or townland with members encouraged to walk alone or in small groups, walking the familiar streets and places, stopping to intercede for those under threat of gender based violence.

Daily 16 Days social media posts were created by Connor and Cashel, these, and other relevant social media posts were shared across the country. Cashel hosted three zoom services and services took place across the island. 16 Days intercessions were forwarded to parishes and branches. Members were encouraged to spread the word far and wide. All dioceses liaised with their local domestic abuse services and items and food vouchers were generously supplied as appropriate.



In Northern Ireland schools noted how heightened their awareness of the lived experience of domestic abuse in the home has now become following the introduction of Operation Encompass. This is a partnership between the PSNI, Safeguarding Board NI, the Education Authority and schools aimed at supporting children who witness domestic violence or abuse in the home.

If Police attend a domestic abuse call, and children are present, Operation Encompass allows the officers to pass on relevant information to the safeguarding team at the child's school early the following morning, so the right support can be put in place. The information shared by Police is treated in strict confidence.

- The Changing the Story Kintsugi Hope Wellbeing Group runs for 12 weeks starting on Monday 12th February 7.30pm to 9pm

We leave the final words with Bishop Andrew Forster, spoken at the close of the Changing the Story Conference in Portadown last autumn...

Mothers' Union All Ireland Conference 2023

The Mothers' Union All Ireland Conference took place in An Grianán, Termonfeckin, Co. Louth from Friday 24th March until Sunday 26th March. It was a wonderful weekend of prayer, fellowship and working with some inspirational speakers.

On the Friday evening delegates were welcomed to the Conference by June Butler, All Ireland President. Our newly appointed All Ireland Chaplain addressed those gathered, Olive Good told us all about MU Enterprise and we were also introduced to Stephanie Nunn, Head of Membership, MSH.



An inspirational prayer walk was organised for the morning of Saturday 25th by Mrs Claire Smith, Faith & Policy Unit Coordinator & Prayer Representative Armagh. Claire brought along her mandolin and accompanied us with the singing of hymns.

Later in the morning delegates assembled in the Kellog's Hall to watch a video message from Sheran Harper, Worldwide President of Mothers' Union, and Steph Nunn spoke to us about Reimagining Mothers' Union and some of the ideas that had come out of the Reimagining Conference in Liverpool. We broke into Diocesan groups to discuss and reflect on what Steph had said. We were delighted to welcome The Most Reverend John McDowell who gave a Reflection and said Grace before lunch.









On Saturday evening before Compline there was a fun filled entertainment section during which members divided into groups to create cocktails. The room was filled with a great buzz of chatter and laughter as the various "concoctions" were created. The groups then were invited to give an account of their cocktail and the "reports" were enjoyed by everyone we are not sure, however, that the resulting cocktails were fit for human consumption.





Sunday morning began with a service of Holy Communion led by Revd. Canon Katharine Poulton, Rector of St. Mary's, Julianstown Union of Parishes. Down & Dromore News



Clogher News

The Trustees of Clogher Diocesan Mothers' Union facilitated a breakfast in Maguiresbridge Parish Hall on Saturday 25th November to mark 16 days of activism against gender based domestic violence. Valerie McMorris, MU Faith and Policy coordinator organised the event. The Rector of Maguiresbridge and Derrybrusk, the Rev Lindsey Farrell said grace and welcomed Mothers' Union members.



After a delicious breakfast served by Barbara Pinkerton and her team from Omagh, Heather Ellis, Diocesan President introduced the first speaker - Sergeant Ann Lavery from the Community Planning and Vulnerability Department of the PSNI, spoke of her work as the designated Sergeant for Fermanagh and Omagh Council area. We were made aware of the significant numbers of domestic abuse cases and how the PSNI works with agencies to help victims. They work with other agencies in a Multi-Agency Support Hub. Their work is also extended to schools where they have introduced the 'Operation Compass Programme' and they make young people aware of how to identify healthy relationships.

The second speaker was Michelle Alonso, a training coordinator with Women's Aid in Enniskillen. Their staff work with the police and also local church and community leaders. Michelle went on to tell us that the most dangerous place for many of the women they help is in the home. Last year they supported 368 women and 350 children. They have a waiting list of women waiting for support. They manage many cases where women experience coercive control behaviour, have money withheld from t hem, are belittled or inflicted with physical abuse. Siobhan McKenna from Tearmann Domestic Abuse in Co Monaghan then spoke about her work and how plans are in place to progress a 'Safe House' in Co Monaghan which is very much needed as families in Co Monaghan often have to travel to Sligo and Co Meath for safety.

Members of Mothers' Union Branches in the Diocese brought and donated items for Women's Aid and Tearmann and vouchers were donated to be given to families who have insufficient funds to buy basic items. Closing prayers were led by Irene Boyd, Joy Graham and Linda Keating.





Those attending were provided with literature published by Mothers' Union and the PSNI to raise awareness of domestic abuse. All clergy in the Diocese will be offered the opportunity to learn more about the newly launched Mothers' Union RISE UP campaign.

A message from the Diocesan President:

As you may be aware Mothers' Union was founded in 1876 and is a women-led movement with 4 million members across the world who are passionate about transforming and improving family life. We are a very inclusive organisation, and we pray for a future in which everyone in our community can thrive. Mothers'

Union membership is a privilege. Our membership only costs us the price of 10 cups of coffee per year. With these monies seek to build resilience in individuals, families and communities at home and across the world. For example, our overseas contributions have enabled projects such as the 20 years of work in Burundi on literacy and financial education which has benefited over 165,000 individuals, helping us to lift families out of poverty. Mothers' Union continues to reach out to disadvantaged women across the world, support widows and advocate against child marriage.

I believe a key challenge facing us today in many aspects of church life is leadership. How do we engage with our leaders? How do we support and encourage them? Are we helping to identify leaders in different areas of our church or community organisations? It is a problem for us if we don't view people in our community and in our churches as potential leaders. So, it is important to engage with willing volunteers and encourage them. Dublin & Glendalough Mothers' Union Spring Gathering:


